

Community Literacy of Ontario offered national *Foundational Training in Family Literacy* online to 21 participants working in diverse community literacy agencies from across Ontario. CLO is extremely pleased to announce that Ontario's first class will graduate in June 2003. Participants will be presented with official certificates from Maureen Sanders, Executive Director of the Centre for Family Literacy, during the final online course module to be held on June 19, 2003.

CLO's intensive online training took place once per month from January to June 2003. Each module was four hours in length. Our dedicated participants further augmented this rigorous online training with self-study of the course manual, homework assignments, supplementary readings, and an online discussion group on AlphaCom. The evaluation results were overwhelmingly positive and clearly demonstrated that our participants found the content, the facilitation and the online learning experience to be extremely valuable.

CLO's online training was based upon the 10-chapter, 370-page Foundational Training in Family Literacy course manual. This manual was developed by the Centre for Family Literacy and each chapter was written by a variety of experts from universities and family literacy organizations from across Canada. CLO also included various Ontario family literacy case studies from: Dryden Literacy Association; Literacy Council of Niagara West; the Timmins Learning Centre; ALSO (Ottawa); Kingston Literacy; the Wellington County Learning Centre; Road to Reading Festival; Frontier College; Hamilton and District Literacy Council; and the Kingston Family Literacy Centre. In addition, we shared current research from the Making Connections report developed by the Ontario Literacy Coalition and Kingston Literacy. We thank you all for sharing!

Community Literacy of Ontario is also proud to announce that our course is the first *online* adaptation of the national *Foundational Training in Family Literacy* in Canada. CLO worked closely with the Centre for Family Literacy to ensure that the online training maintained the integrity of the original *Foundational Training* while at the same time being adapted both for online use and for an Ontario context. Community Literacy of Ontario has extensive experience in developing and delivering online training. CLO has developed 14 online workshops and is a leader in using this new technology.

Funding for this online training was provided by the National Literacy Secretariat (HRDC) and the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities. CLO's training was facilitated and adapted for online use by Joanne Kaattari, Margaret Maynard, Penny Smith-Jensen and Vicki Trottier.

If you are interested in this valuable national training, don't despair – the Ontario Literacy Coalition will be offering *Foundational Training* at a Training Institute at a later date. Further, CLO has applied for funding to redeliver the online training again to a new group of participants next year. Please contact either organization directly for more details.

## CLO's Hot New Resource! Skills for the Future: A Training Resource for Literacy Practitioners

The demands placed on literacy practitioners are many and varied. If you are feeling just a little busy, then CLO's latest resource "Skills for the Future: A Training Resource for Literacy Practitioners" may be just what the doctor ordered! To learn why this is a "must have" resource for any literacy agency, just look at the table of contents and see for yourself:

Tell me more you say! Well, CLO is always glad to oblige... "Understanding the Need" provides an overview of the field of literacy from a national and a provincial perspective. This snapshot of literacy is focused on the role of community-based agencies in "Understanding the Role of Your Agency". Volunteers have historically played an important role in community literacy agencies in Ontario. In "Understanding the Role of The Volunteer" the various elements of volunteer management are explored.

The reasons why adults decide to improve or get help with their literacy skills are many. Literacy agencies need to be aware of the challenges that learners may face so they can provide the best possible learning environment for all learners. "The Adult Literacy Learner" looks at the key factors that influence and affect learning and provides checklists and other tools to help agencies identify challenges and solutions.

The task of assessing and identifying the learning needs of adults in literacy agencies in Ontario is placed between two strong and equally demanding forces: one of actual learning (what is learned and how it is learned) and the other of accountability (how you prove it was learned). In "Identifying and Meeting Learner Needs", a learning outcomes approach provides a framework for discussing learner involvement from intake to skill demonstrations.

"Instructional Strategies" will challenge you to think about process in the development of instructional strategies in a learning outcomes environment. Sample instructional strategies are provided and a list of suggested resources (print, online and software) is provided at the end of each section.

Learners are important sources of information about the programs they are attending. "Learner Exit and Follow-up" looks at the process of exit and the types of information that you should collect—for both program planning and to meet funder requirements. Sample strategies are provided to help you examine your current practice and also to help you plan for the future. "Professional Development" focuses on the central role of the literacy practitioner and the value of professional development for improving literacy instruction and practice.

"Skills for the Future: A Training Resource for Literacy Practitioners" is part of CLO's practitioner training strategy. Lindsay Kennedy is the researcher and author of this extremely valuable training and orientation resource. It is also being reviewed and edited by a team of experts from the sector. We bet you now wish you'd volunteered for a CLO reference group so you could get a sneak preview of this wonderful resource!

"A Training Resource for Literacy Practitioners" was funded with the generous support of the National Literacy Secretariat (HRDC) and the Ontario Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities. It will be circulated at the end of September 2003 to all Anglophone community literacy agencies and to all regional literacy networks.
