KEY FACTS ABOUT CANADA'S CHARITIES FROM IMAGINE CANADA

Community-based literacy agencies know that charities matter! However, isn't it great that Imagine Canada has compiled the statistics and economic impact of Canada's Charities? Have a look at these "Key Facts about Charities in Canada". We have any amazing impact! Key Fact about Charities in Canada:

- Canada's charitable and nonprofit sector is the 2nd largest in the world; the Netherlands is the largest; the United States is 5th
- There are an estimated 170,000 nonprofits and charities in Canada
- Half of these (54%) are run entirely by volunteers
- 2 million people are employed by these organizations representing 11.1% of the economically active population The sector represents \$106 billion or 8.1% of the GDP (larger than the automotive or manufacturing industries)
- Smaller provinces have a higher number of organizations relative to their populations
- The top 1% of organizations command 60% of all revenues

Imagine Canada has also prepared an excellent report called "Charities in Canada as an Economic Sector".

With these workbooks, agencies can provide clients with employability skills and literacy/Essential Skills simultaneously.
- Community Literacy of Ontario's "<u>Numeracy in Action</u>" curriculum resource guide helps learners requiring enhanced numeracy skills. Topics include: Manage Money; Manage Time; Use Numbers; and Manage Data.
