Community Literacy of Ontario has consistently heard from its members about the effectiveness of using experiential learning with LBS learners. CLO'S MEETING WITH THE HONOURABLE MERRILEE FULLERTON, MINISTER OF TRAINING, COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

In March 2019, CLO was very happy to meet with the Honourable Merrilee Fullerton, Minister of Training, Colleges and Universities. Two CLO staff members, Jette Cosburn and Joanne Kaattari, and a CLO board member, Barbara McFater, attended this meeting.

CLO had 20 minutes to meet with Minister Fullerton, and we shared the following key messages:

- 1. Literacy is a critical issue for Ontario, and it is integrally linked to poverty, employment, health, civic engagement, and more. (As found in *Literacy: Why It Matters*).
- 2. The LBS program is an important part of Employment Ontario and it is foundational to issues that matter to citizens and to the Ministry. We shared the need to protect and enhance the LBS budget.
- 3. We shared the basic goals identified in MTCU's LBS Improvement and Expansion process (LBS evaluation), and the importance of restarting this process to address the needs of LBS.
- 4. We shared brief success stories of how LBS works on the ground. We left the Minister and her staff with several resources highlighting program successes.

The Minister was genuinely interested in, and supportive of, LBS. Key messages were shared with the Minister about the importance of literacy and the critical roles played by LBS programming. CLO team members were pleased with this meeting and we hope to follow-up again at a later date.





FOUR NEW CURRICULA FOR LBS

During the past year, CLO researched curriculum gaps and areas of high demand from learners and practitioners. We worked with four community-based LBS agencies, who have extensive experience in curriculum development, to write, revise and adapt curricula for LBS agencies.

CLO and the curriculum development team are very proud to share the following curricula:


- Clerical and Office Administration (Kingston Literacy & Skills)

LITERACY AS A POVERTY REDUCTION STRATEGY: FRONTIER COLLEGE'S NATIONAL RESEARCH REPORT

Frontier College recently released its <u>National Research Report on Literacy and Essential Skills as a Poverty Reduction Strategy</u>. The report reveals how increased literacy enables Canadians to move out of poverty and recommends that governments recognize literacy as political priority and a human right.

People with low literacy levels are more likely to experience poverty in Canada. One in five Canadians struggle with reading, writing or math, and millions more do not have the essential skills to succeed in today's economy. The stigma surrounding low literacy, and the everyday systems and tasks that assume strong literacy skills, may affect a person's ability to find and use the services they need to lift them out of poverty.

Frontier College and its research partner, The Social Research and Demonstration Corporation, completed a comprehensive review of existing literature, and surveyed and interviewed local and national literacy associations, poverty reduction organizations, service providers, policy makers, researchers, and individuals.




LITERACY LOST: CANADA'S BASIC SKILLS SHORTFALL
