
Helpful Resources for Serving Adult Learners Facing Multiple Barriers

Literacy and Essential Skills as a Poverty Reduction Strategy QUILL Learning Network, Pop Up PD for Literacy Educators, September 2019

In <u>Webinar 1</u> of this series, Angela Briscoe from Frontier College discussed research around literacy and poverty reduction. The webinar included an overview of the report's 11 key research findings and 11 strategic recommendations which point to the need for improved coordination and collaboration in efforts to address poverty in our communities. Best practices were highlighted, such as customizing learning resources and using learner-centred approaches that harness the experience and needs of adult learners.

Better Research for Better Practice: Understanding the characteristics, experiences and trajectories of OW clients in Toronto

In Webinar 2 of this series, staff from Toronto Employment and Social Services shared the results of a research study of singles on Ontario Works in Toronto. The focus of the study was to better understand their characteristics, service experiences and needs, how the singles caseload is changing over time, and what factors might predict exits to employment for this population group. Key study findings were presented with points on how to connect research results to frontline service planning and program design.
